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# **StackFormation Documentation**

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Cloudformation framework to support infrastructure-as-code paradigm

## 1.1 Installation

```
pip install jh-stackformation
```

Framework requires python  $\geq 3.5.x$  and Hashicorp Packer in-order to build custom AMI's.

Docker is the preferred method of execution ( all dependencies including packer are included ) however VirtualEnv works A-OK. Reference the demo repo below for examples and helper scripts using the docker images built on docker-hub.

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### 2.1 Stable release

To install StackFormation, run this command in your terminal:

```
$ pip install jh-stackformation
```

This is the preferred method to install StackFormation, as it will always install the most recent stable release.

If you don't have `pip` installed, this [Python installation guide](#) can guide you through the process.

### 2.2 From sources

The sources for StackFormation can be downloaded from the [Github repo](#).

You can either clone the public repository:

```
$ git clone git://github.com/ibejohn818/stackformation
```

Or download the [tarball](#):

```
$ curl -OL https://github.com/ibejohn818/stackformation/tarball/master
```

Once you have a copy of the source, you can install it with:

```
$ python setup.py install
```

## 4.1 Types of Contributions

### 4.1.1 Report Bugs

Report bugs at <https://github.com/ibejohn818/stackformation/issues>.

If you are reporting a bug, please include:

- Your operating system name and version.
- Any details about your local setup that might be helpful in troubleshooting.
- Detailed steps to reproduce the bug.

### 4.1.2 Fix Bugs

Look through the GitHub issues for bugs. Anything tagged with “bug” and “help wanted” is open to whoever wants to implement it.

### 4.1.3 Implement Features

Look through the GitHub issues for features. Anything tagged with “enhancement” and “help wanted” is open to whoever wants to implement it.

## 4.1.4 Write Documentation

StackFormation could always use more documentation, whether as part of the official StackFormation docs, in docstrings, or even on the web in blog posts, articles, and such.

## 4.1.5 Submit Feedback

The best way to send feedback is to file an issue at <https://github.com/ibejohn818/stackformation/issues>.

If you are proposing a feature:

- Explain in detail how it would work.
- Keep the scope as narrow as possible, to make it easier to implement.
- Remember that this is a volunteer-driven project, and that contributions are welcome :)

## 4.2 Get Started!

Ready to contribute? Here's how to set up *stackformation* for local development.

1. Fork the *stackformation* repo on GitHub.
2. Clone your fork locally:

```
$ git clone git@github.com:your_name_here/stackformation.git
```

3. Install your local copy into a virtualenv. Assuming you have virtualenvwrapper installed, this is how you set up your fork for local development:

```
$ mkvirtualenv stackformation
$ cd stackformation/
$ python setup.py develop
```

4. Create a branch for local development:

```
$ git checkout -b name-of-your-bugfix-or-feature
```

Now you can make your changes locally.

5. When you're done making changes, check that your changes pass flake8 and the tests, including testing other Python versions with tox:

```
$ flake8 stackformation tests
$ python setup.py test or py.test
$ tox
```

To get flake8 and tox, just pip install them into your virtualenv.

6. Commit your changes and push your branch to GitHub:

```
$ git add .
$ git commit -m "Your detailed description of your changes."
$ git push origin name-of-your-bugfix-or-feature
```

7. Submit a pull request through the GitHub website.

## 4.3 Pull Request Guidelines

Before you submit a pull request, check that it meets these guidelines:

1. The pull request should include tests.
2. If the pull request adds functionality, the docs should be updated. Put your new functionality into a function with a docstring, and add the feature to the list in README.rst.
3. The pull request should work for Python 2.6, 2.7, 3.3, 3.4 and 3.5, and for PyPy. Check [https://travis-ci.org/ibjohn818/stackformation/pull\\_requests](https://travis-ci.org/ibjohn818/stackformation/pull_requests) and make sure that the tests pass for all supported Python versions.

## 4.4 Tips

To run a subset of tests:

```
$ py.test tests.test_stackformation
```
